

#### CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

The Criminal Investigation Division continued to maintain a commitment of providing a specialized unit, diversified in its approach to criminal investigations. Although the department's work force has been reduced, emphasis toward the investigation of most major crimes is always a high priority. Maintaining an atmosphere of preparedness, in gathering criminal intelligence and case construction, is a key tenant stressed in this division. The Criminal Investigation Division has also performed tasks in the area of safety/security counseling. Furthermore, personnel continue their support and assistance to the various block watch associations. We will continue our participation with various task forces, as well as, partnerships with State and Federal agencies.

The Criminal Investigation Division reviews each case, through use of a system of solvability factors. Based on this review, cases are selected and assigned to appropriate investigators. In addition, investigators meet personally with the victims of the case to which they have been assigned. Detectives continually follow up on all possible leads regarding open cases until all avenues have been exhausted. In certain situations, detectives will seek extradition, assist in the service of search warrants and issue polygraph exams through our trained investigator.

The Criminal Investigations Division has continued to work with technical service personnel implementing improvements to our reporting software. Technical improvements introduced were new personal high definition cameras and investigative case tracking software. A major goal and objective for the coming year will be emphasis on information sharing. It is necessary to collaborate with others and develop a partnership focused on problem solving. A two way flow of information is crucial, along with a strong commitment to a Community Policing philosophy, assisted through our School Resource Officer Program. Improving our community relationships will be two-fold: information sharing and advanced training, thus improving the odds in crime solvability and prevention. This community partnership will assist the department in identifying high crime areas, along with an early warning system for future issues within the community. Our investigators and supervisors will continue to diversify and structure their training to improve skills and solvability ratios.

#### **SUPPORT OPERATIONS**

Support Operations services of the Warren Police Department currently covers clerical employees, the 911 Communication Center, Motor Vehicle Maintenance, and Information Technology.

Other areas that fall within the responsibility of this Division are Grant Administration, records management, research and development.

Motor Vehicle Maintenance is managed by Patrolman Harrell to include all daily maintenance of the Police Department's fleet of vehicles. Harrell continues to review the cost effectiveness of each vehicle in order to maximize the use and life expectancy. The last fleet of twelve vehicles were purchased in the summer of 2012. He has streamlined the maintenance in cooperation with our Operations department.

The Support Operations administers the network computer as well as the city wide communications systems. The City of Warren is the backup system for the Trumbull County 911 Center. ID Networks is now in full implementation for records management and information sharing.

The Warren 911 Communication Center currently has four new 911 systems and five new CAD systems. The department is able to utilize the officers in a more efficient manner allowing them to initiate report writing and receive calls for service from their vehicles. Officers can make direct inquiries into operational informational systems. This directly supports the officer's street level decision making. Location systems have been installed and collect location oriented data. The services provide the mechanism for coordination, control and above all officer safety.

The Warren City Police Department continues to pursue grants that supplement law enforcement. The Support Operations Commander continues to administer the grant programs and searches for funding opportunities.

This division will strive to be effective and continue to use our resources wisely.

#### 911 Communication Center

The Radio Communication Division covers a broad spectrum of services for the Warren Police Department, along with the other city-wide departments. Our main objective and goal is to provide courteous, professional efficient service to the public, police personnel and the other city departments.

The Division consists of twelve full time Communication Coordinators. Within the division, there is one Communication Coordinator Supervisor, a Communication Terminal Agency Coordinator (T.A.C.) and a Communicator Coordinator Assistant T.A.C.

The Division operates on a 24/7 basis 365 days a year. A minimum of two operators are on duty at all times. The division answers eight 10 digit phone lines along with four 911 emergency lines and one TTD hearing impaired line. The Division is responsible for disseminating all calls for service to police and fire personnel, emergency EMS responders and all City services via radio or phone. The Division also handles all walk-in traffic, tow releases and reports requests.

The Communication Division is responsible for all LEADS (law enforcement automated data system) entries which include all warrants, stolen vehicles, missing persons, runaway juveniles, protection orders, missing/stolen license plates, guns, towed vehicles and miscellaneous items. The Communications Coordinator T.A.C. is responsible for all facets of the LEADS operations, training, and validations. The T.A.C. maintains all documentation and security policies.

The Communications Coordinators are the first line of communication to the community by extracting and recording essential information and giving proper advice/ and or information to callers. Retrieves and accurately relays to requesting police field units information contained in the state LEADS and National NCIC computer systems. Maintains proper records of all response units dispatches (assigned and unit self-initiated).

The coordinators assigned to this function are supervised by a police officer from the Support Operations Division.
